The year 2024 marked the beginning of a new team dedicated to enhancing our education programme and expanding the number of schools we could reach with our educational talks. Although progress was gradual at the outset, by the end of the year the programme was operating at full momentum.

# **Dog Programme 2024**

In 2024, the OSPCA rehomed 12 dogs and puppies. We also reunited over 50 lost or stray dogs with owners, mainly through social media. A lot of the lost or stray dogs unfortunately can be connected with weather conditions, for example, storms, breakages in fencing, gates blowing open and also around Halloween.

Our rehoming procedure included discussing the suitability of a particular dog, and the commitment of the perspective adoptive family. A home check was always carried out prior to an adoption taking place. It is stressed to people adopting from us that a rescue dog will take time to settle into a new environment, and we are always available to help or advise with any problems that may arise during the settling in period. On the rare occasions a dog doesn't settle with their new family, we insist on the dog being returned to us.

All dogs taken into our care are treated for parasites, fully vaccinated, neutered and microchipped. We ask for an adoption donation of €200, which partially covers the cost of the vet treatment. The OSPCA dog programme is committed to educating the public regarding dog welfare, in particular, the importance of neutering and microchipping, and ensuring dogs are identifiable by collar/ID tag. In 2024, we offered subsidised neutering for female dogs and also subsidised microchipping for both male and female dogs. We liaised with neighbouring dog rescues, exchanging general information including lost/found dogs, enquiries about specific breeds or problems in a particular area.

We were one of the first rescues in the country to offer a subsidised neutering and microchipping of XL Bully Breeds to enable compliance with new regulations. The scheme initially ran from he 9<sup>th</sup> September to the 4<sup>th</sup> October. Funding allowing we will hope to extend this scheme into 2025.

# Cat & Kitten Programme 2024

During 2024, the number of calls received concerning cats and kittens increased considerably. Reports included stray cats, sick or injured animals, pregnant cats, and litters of kittens both with and without their mothers. We also responded to numerous cases involving kittens found in car engines, sheds, garages, on roadsides, and in other extraordinary or dangerous locations. Many were suffering from broken limbs, eye infections, or other serious injuries.

This sharp rise in kitten-related calls is deeply concerning, particularly when we consider that the Offaly SPCA contributed towards the neutering of 935 felines in 2024. One volunteer aptly described the situation as "trying to mop up with the tap still running." At times, it can feel like a never-ending task — yet every kitten saved brings immense reward and purpose to our efforts.

As we do not operate an animal shelter, we are entirely dependent on the extraordinary kindness, care, compassion, and dedication of our wonderful fosterers. Without these selfless individuals, our work simply would not be possible. Thanks to their commitment, we are able to rescue, rehabilitate, and care for countless vulnerable kittens and cats.

Many of our rescues arrive sick, injured, frightened, malnourished, and exhausted. Each is examined, treated, and cared for with great gentleness. They are provided with nutritious food, warmth, and soft bedding — often for the first time in their lives. Through this care, they begin to recover, trust, and flourish.

Our rescued animals are truly remarkable. Having known hardship, hunger, and fear, they come to deeply appreciate the kindness and love shown to them by their carers.

# Feral Cat Awareness and Neutering Programme

A feral cat is one that has never been handled or socialised as a kitten and has therefore become a "wild" cat. Through no fault of their own, these animals struggle to survive against immense odds — facing hunger, exposure, and a lack of care or shelter.

Adding to their hardship, feral cats breed uncontrollably, with females capable of producing up to three litters per year. By the time a mother cat is rearing her third litter, her first litter may already be reproducing as well. One unneutered female cat can be responsible for bringing up to 35 kittens into her territory in just 14 months. The rate of population growth — and resulting overpopulation — is truly staggering. The most effective and humane way to manage this crisis is through timely neutering. Quite simply, prevention is the cure. By neutering feral and stray cats, we can stop the cycle of suffering before it begins.

At Offaly SPCA, we actively support the community in this effort. We offer the loan of humane cat traps (subject to a fully refundable deposit to ensure their safe return) and provide neutering vouchers at a cost of just €10 per cat. Offaly SPCA covers the remaining veterinary costs directly with participating vets throughout the county.

Unfortunately, many calls we receive come after litters have already been born — when kittens are found in sheds, gardens, garages, greenhouses, or shrubbery. Often, we are asked if someone can "come out and take them all away." Regrettably, this is not possible. We do not operate an animal shelter, nor do we have the volunteers required to collect or trap feral cats on site. However, we empower members of the public to take action themselves by using our equipment and vouchers to trap and neuter stray or feral cats before the problem escalates.

In 2024, **Offaly SPCA** contributed to the neutering of 935 cats and kittens — an extraordinary achievement for a small, entirely voluntary charity operating with limited resources.

To prevent further overpopulation and unnecessary suffering, we urge everyone to take part in this vital effort:

Do something extraordinary. Neuter your own cat — and any strays you can help.

# **Financial Report 2024**

2024 started off on a good financial footing. We had received a Welfare grant from The Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine in December 2023 to be used in 2024 in the Offaly area. This sum of €42,425 was very gratefully received and together with a credit balance from 2023 enabled us to start planning for the year.

In 2024 as in previous years, the general public were very generous with donations which were received through PayPal, Facebook, Direct Debits and through our Office. We also receive some large donations from local companies who wish to remain anonymous. Other types of donations come into the office in the form of Cat/Dog food, bedding and various other items. This enables us to spend more money on the vet bills and run more neuter campaigns. Once again, a big thank you to our Volunteers who help every year with our various fundraising events. Our church gate collections brought in €4,250 even though the amount of people attending the mass is down considerably, as a lot of people are participating online. We are so grateful to everyone who donates to our organisation no matter how big or small.

As you can see from our income and expenditure sheet attached, the majority of our money is spent on vet bills. All other bills are necessary to keep the office running so we can continue to carry out our work and support to the public with any animal welfare concerns.

We would like to thank everyone who supports us year on year. To the wonderful vets who continue to help us with reduced rates so we can help more animals who need it - thank you. A massive thank you to our wonderful accountants Helena Grattan and a special thanks to Mr Tom Stokes who continues to let us rent our office in Market Place at a very favourable rate. We could not carry out our work without this wonderful space.
